The Holmes Family

The Holmes family has been in the village since about 1700. The first record is of Nicholas, who married Elizabeth Pearson of Baslow in 1705. He may well have come from elsewhere and stay after he married.

Subsequently the record of births show that four men called Holmes started having children in the 1730s – all likely to be sons of Nicholas though there is no confirmation. Of these, Robert's family can be followed as shown in the family tree.

Later, as confirmed in the Tithe Award of 1848, the family home was Cherry Tree Farm, located behind today's Spar Shop in Over End.

Robert Holmes appears in the Enclosure award as owner a field off Over Lane, a fact confirmed in the Tithe Award.

The family were still present in the farm in 1939
